Need care when your primary provider isn't available? You have options!

If you need immediate care but don't think you need to go to an emergency room (ER), consider going to a Harvard Pilgrim participating urgent care center or convenience care clinic. These options can get you taken care of more quickly, and cost you less.

Remember, though, if you think you're having a medical emergency, call 911 or go to the nearest ER.
